From The President - Di Lengui

I want to start with a heartfelt thank you to everybody, for your time, support, and efforts during the 2018/19 season. What a generous group of people you all are, to freely give up your time, for the benefit of others. Because of all your contributions, we have had another successful season. Every one of the 15,909 visitors to our beach went home safely. First aid was given to 161 of these visitors, 12 of them were rescued, and there were 1,101 preventative actions, that kept them safe.

I would like to acknowledge the efforts of all the members, past and present, that got the club to where it is now. It has come a long way from its humble beginnings as a shed in the sand, some of our members have been giving their time to this club for the whole 50 years.

Our club has seen its biggest membership in 10 years, with a huge 42% increase in nippers, making it the fastest growing program in Queensland, not a bad effort for one of Queensland's smaller clubs. A very big congratulations to the team for making the program the well run success that it was. I would also like to say congratulations and welcome, to the nipper parents that took the plunge and did their Bronze medallion, becoming some of our newest Lifesavers. In total we have an additional 22 Bronzies and 18 SRC's, which has given our Active Member numbers a great boost, welcome to all of you and I look forward to seeing you all on the beach next season.

This season we trialled the split patrols, we got a new trailer, we now have a website, we have a surf boat crew again, they made it to the finals at the State titles, we have our first Pool Rescue Team and we employed a coach that saw us have an increase in participation, and better performance at carnivals. There is much to be proud of in our clubs 50th year.

I want to say a big thank you to all our generous sponsors, not only do they give us financial support, they also give their time to support our events, and one of our major sponsors is also one of our newest Bronzies.

Thank you to all of the Officers and Committee members for their time and effort over the season. You've all done a great job yet again! George Hanson is stepping aside from his roles on the Management Committee after 28 years. Thanks George for your commitment and dedication to Marcoola SLSC and for all your support in my first year as president.

On a personal note, my first year as President has been a roller coaster at times, but I'm here now writing my first report, I made it. My journey with the club started as a nipper parent. In 2008 I became a Bronzie, I have been a carnival official for nippers, competed in Masters events, taught First Aid, and other roles, that I can't remember. To all the committee members, both Supporters and Surf, thank you for everything, your support, encouragement and advice, and to our fabulous Life Savings Operations Manager, I am very grateful for everything.

From Lifesaving Operations Manager - Olivia Wilson

The 2018/19 season marked my second season with Marcoola, and I think we did a pretty great job as a team! There are a number of highlights and thank-you's from me this year, so I'll do my best to capture everything! I'm always extremely humbled by the amount our volunteers do, and although there were definitely some challenges, I can't thank everyone enough for their efforts this season.

There are a few people who deserve a special thank you from me (I hope I don't miss anyone!)

Lyn Mathison finished up with us (completely this time) after our charity financial year ended at the end of April. Lyn dedicated over 20 years as an employee and many more years as a volunteer and her legacy will last for many more years to come. Thank you Lynnie for your patience in this transition period, and I hope you can finally enjoy your retirement!

Amanda Janssen - my right-hand-man. Not sure what I would have done without you this season. Your dedication is second to none and passion unquestionable. We're a pretty good team you & I, and I feel like we're just getting started! I can't wait to see which goals we can kick next year.

Craig Hunter-Smith - I am genuinely grateful for your knowledge and experience in how to run a business and your 'no bullsh*t' approach to everything. Whether it is nailing something to a wall, picking up an IRB from Cooroy or the number of times I see your name on a raffle sheet when you weren't rostered on. Rob Jenkins - I'm sure you've all seen the new board storage area out the back. Jenko put in a lot of time and effort into getting this sorted, as well as sorting out the Nipper shed and a lot of the patrol equipment. Along with the many, many hours he spent on patrol, doing water safety and helping train every Bronze/ SRC squad we put through this year. Thanks for everything you do Jenko - it doesn't go unnoticed.

The Building Committee headed by Peter Hourn who have had a massive job this year with an awful lot of work needing to be done on the internal framework/ wiring of the building and investigations into future works. The training room got a well- overdue renovation thanks to the coordination of Richard Phillips. Allan Davidson has been around an awful lot doing bits & pieces the last few months especially. Thank you to the whole team - it's a big job but it's in very capable hands with you all!

Di & Skip - thanks for all of your effort in your first year as arguably the biggest jobs in the club. There's been lots of learning-curves for everyone this year, but with such big shoes to fill it was always going to be tough! Your weekly visits and check-ins were all very welcomed and congratulations for making it through your first season!

Warren Chambers - our trusty cleaner! This man is here every Monday cleaning our member's area, making sure the communal areas downstairs and all the bathrooms are sand free and sparkly clean. Sometimes it probably seems like quite a thankless job, but we are so thankful he does it!

Membership

Our Membership numbers are the highest they have been in 10 years and active membership is up by 15% from last year which is a huge achievement. The high total Membership numbers can be attributed to the huge influx of Nippers and their parents. The boost in active members can largely be attributed to those Nipper parents who have put their hands up to do their Bronze or SRC.

From me personally, my best memories from when I did Nippers was having my dad swim along-side me out in the surf as my support as water safety. I can't wait to see more parents take the plunge and build that relationship with their kids, because I genuinely believe having Lifesaving as something we could do together throughout childhood and my most formative years as a pre-teen and teenager is why we still have such a strong bond now.

Junior Activities

Our Nippers have had a cracking year, with Amanda spearheading one of the best Nipper Programs I have ever seen. In my previous job, I looked after Junior Activities for Surf Life Saving Queensland and each year we would do club visits to every club in Queensland, as well as some inter-state clubs, so I've literally seen it all! We should consider ourselves very lucky that we have someone as dedicated as Amanda looking after our Nipper army. A number of new initiatives this year have ensured our kids are not just learning how to duck dive and ride a board – they're learning life skills that can't be taught anywhere else and making friends for life.

Lifesaving

Most notably, we should recognise that we've again achieved our vision of 'zero preventable deaths in Marcoola waters', so our volunteers have done a great job once again! We trialled split patrols in an effort to get more people familiar with others in the club, and I think on the most part it was quite successful.

The coastline was bombarded with Bluebottles over summer which kept our Lifesavers busy. First aid treatments were up considerably from last season to 161!

Operationally we were tested on the last day of patrol with the missing person search off Mudjimba Island. There is more on this search from Dave in the ERG report, but on behalf of the club, thank you to everyone who took part in that search – many of you fronted up at dawn every day until he was found.

Congratulations also to Dave McLean who was awarded National Rescue of the Month in February for shark attack at Point Cartwright.

50 Year Celebrations

We've had a number of occasions this year celebrating our 50 years, and it's with a huge thank-you to the 50 year committee that has put so much time and effort into making the 50 years something to remember! There are still a number of events to come, and the special release of our history book is one of these! Keep an eye on emails and social media to see what's on!

Summer Surf Ambassador – Kirralee Barnard

A huge thank you to Kirralee Barnard who represented Marcoola for the Summer Surf Ambassador program this season. Kirralee raised over \$38,000 for the club through her many events and fundraising activities, as well as spending a lot of time in the community preaching the surf safety message.

Kirralee sacrificed a lot this year to take part in the program, and the club is extremely grateful for her efforts. It was a huge year of growth for her, and she did us all proud when she stood up in front of the crowd at the final ball and spoke about her pride and love for Marcoola and the Red & Yellow.

Given Trav was out with a knee injury and young Alex (who is only 15) coming up to take his spot for the day, these results are outstanding and no doubt have put Marcoola well and truly on the Surf Boat map! Thanks Stephen de Laurence for leading the boys. They did a great job all season, and the Surf Boats area at Marcoola will only get stronger next season!

We had a paid board coach this year for the first time ever, Conor Burrows. In their first season with Conor, our Nippers especially saw significant improvements across their competitions, and were competitive in all carnivals. Thanks Conor for your hard work and dedication to our kids and we can't wait to see what you can do with them next season!

At State Titles, Owen Small placed 5th in the 40-44 Surf Race & 7th in the 40-44 Tube race finals. Lachlan Maltman ran 4th in the 40-44 Flags. Congrats fellas!

Youth Development

Our Youth Development Officers Brook Hagan & Grace Ramsay with the help of Riley Palmer have worked tirelessly this season to give our youth members the best possible weekend program, and advocating for the youth at a Management Committee level. From The Treasurer - Lyn Hourn

First and foremost, I would like to acknowledge the dedication and commitment shown by Brian Goulding for filling the position of Treasurer of the Marcoola Surf Lifesaving Club for many of the past 25 years. Thanks to the efforts of Brian, and previous committees, the club is in a very healthy financial condition (i.e. debt-free with some money aside for stormy times). Thank you Brian!

I'd also like to acknowledge the amazing effort by Lyn Mathison who retired in May this year (after several attempts!!). For more than 20 years, in the role of Administrator and/or Bookkeeper, Lynnie has been fastidious with our accounts and bookkeeping and I will miss her thoroughness and dedication. Thank you Lynnie!

The 2018-2019 financial year has shown a marked decrease in total income of \$73,000. Cash donations from the Supporters Club were down approximately \$125,000 from \$405,000 the previous year to \$280,000 this year. Some of this decrease can be apportioned to the redirection of expenses such as Insurance costs that have previously been paid by the Surf Club but were this year paid by the Supporters Club, as well as the Supporters Club self-funding the purchase of new Gaming Machines (in previous years the Surf Club has provided a loan to the Supporters Club for the purchase of gaming machines).

A special thank you to Junior Activities, Youth Development, Competitors and Surf Girl committee for their efforts in fundraising to support their programs and costs. Raffles income for the year showed a marked increase from \$75,000 to \$85,000. Well done!

Our income this year was also boosted by the efforts of our beautiful Summer Surf Ambassador entrant Kirralee Barnard and her committee, who raised just over \$38,000. Thank you Kirralee - we hope you enjoyed the experience and you can now take a well-deserved break.

Thank you also to our club sponsors. We value the continued support from our major sponsors North Shore Realty, Bendigo Bank, our local state member Fiona Simpson, Qld Yoghurt and Yaroomba Beach. In addition to these are the many other sponsors that provide a significant income for the club. Due to the efforts of Amanda Janssen and Olivia Wilson we have many new sponsors this year. We hope that these sponsors will continue with our club for many years to come.

In addition to her many tasks, our Operational Manager Olivia Wilson has been working hard on improving our marketing, sponsorships, memberships and grants. This year she has increased our grants income from \$37,000 to over \$42,000. Thanks Olivia.

This year has been an interesting year with many committee positions filled by new committee members. Although it has been a steep learning curve for many of us, I believe all have done very well. Thank you to the contributions from all members of the club and our extended community family - it really is a team effort to achieve what we do. Thank you!!

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Financial Reporting Framework

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1981 (Queensland). The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

Statement of Compliance

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the Associations Incorporation Act 1981 (Queensland), the basis of accounting specified by all Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of Accounting Standards AASB 101: Presentation of Financial Statements, AASB 108: Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors and AASB 1054: Australian Additional Disclosures.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on an accrual basis and are based on historical costs. They do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

(a) Income Tax

The Club has received an exemption from income tax from the Australian Taxation Office under Section 50-40 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(b) Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all PPE is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

Class of Fixed Asset	Depreciation Rate
Building	2.5%
Plant and equipment	20%
Motor vehicles	15%

(c) Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the committee reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

(d) Employee Provisions

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

(e) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

(f) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(g) Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

(h) Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt. If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

(i) Leases

Leases of PPE, where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset (but not the legal ownership) are transferred to the association, are classified as finance leases.

Finance leases are capitalised by recording an asset and a liability at the lower of the amounts equal to the fair value of the leased property or the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual values. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for that period.

Leased assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of their estimated useful lives or the lease term. Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses in the periods in which they are incurred.

(j) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

(k) Accounts payable and other payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.

From The Emergency Response Group

Whilst fairly quiet on the call out front for Marcoola ERG, until the last weekend of the season that was, we did attend to several incidents in some shape or form.

In October our Duty Officers were called to Noosa National Park to assist with a Search for a missing person who was threatening Self Harm. Lifesaving Services, LS 46, Police and SES conducted a widespread search over several days but, despite locating the man's vehicle, he has still never been located. This was one of the first request for use of Drones in SLSQ history, but the drones had been grounded by the then CEO and could not be utilised in the search.

In November member Ben Claydon who with his pregnant wife was walking his dog early morning at Dicky Beach, performed CPR on a Stand-up paddle boarder that had been pulled from the water. Ben assisted with CPR whilst his wife Allana called Emergency Services. Ben worked on the man until Lifesavers and Paramedics arrived. Unfortunately, the man could not be saved and may have suffered a medical incident prior to his collapsing in the water. Ben has been nominated for an excellence award for his efforts.

November also saw Duty Officers respond to early morning calls to assist 13SURF tasking officer attend to a shark attack off Moffat Beach. 30 year old Kyle Roberts was fishing 1km off Moffat Beach in a Kayak when he was attacked by a 4M Tiger Shark which punctured the hull of his Kayak. Duty officers assisted co-ordination of the Search and arranged for Lifesaver 46 Helicopter to attend whilst talking to coast guard. Police and the victim through coastguard radio systems. The patient was located with his Kayak sinking and returned to waiting Police and Paramedics. Duty Officer's Graham Sharry & David McLean and Lifesavers Jacob Thompson & Nathan Steer were awarded the Surf Life Saving Australia National Rescue of the Month for their efforts.

In December Duty Officers were called in to assist with a swimmer's welfare who had swum from Maroochydore to Marcoola. The man was suffering some health issues and concerns were raised for his welfare when he refused the assistance of Lifesavers to return to shore. Duty Officer D McLean attended and called Police and QAs who attended and assessed the man and transported him to hospital.

In February Peer Support Officer Olivia Wilson was tasked to Met Caloundra to debrief members there who had been involved in a drowning and resuscitation. Duty Officers were also required to assist with communications and support during an incident of a reported missing swimmer at Noosa. Nothing was located and believed the swimmer had made it back to shore.

In April Duty Officers received overflow calls from Bundaberg 13SURF service of flares spotted off Dundowran Beach. Services from Bundaberg were tasked but could not locate anything. Hervey Bay Water Police used Helicopters the following morning, but again failed to locate anything.

In May on the last day of the season our members assisted in the search for a missing Jet Skier who had come off the back of his Jet Ski between Old Woman Island and Twin Waters. The massive search escalated and was the first time Drones were used by SLSQ for a prolonged Search & Rescue Event. Even though the season had finished members went above and beyond returning the following 2 days and taking time off out of their private work and personal lives to return and assist the search. Our members were conducting Shore Line Searches from 4.30 am and finishing at last light around 7pm. Unfortunately, the person was found deceased on the Wednesday 1.1km off Old Woman Island despite the best efforts of Water Police, Police Divers, Lifesaver 46, Pol Air, Our Drones and Operations Support Teams, Lifeguards, Mudjimba SLSC & Marcoola SLSC. The search was extensive using multiple resources from both clubs as well as Operations support. We would like to acknowledge the following for their assistance and going above and beyond the call of duty.

The Port Campbell Tragedy is a reminder of how we need to weigh up risk versus gain each time we venture out. We commend our members who go above and beyond their normal call of duty to provide this value added assistance and lifesaving service for Surf Life Saving Qld and the general public.

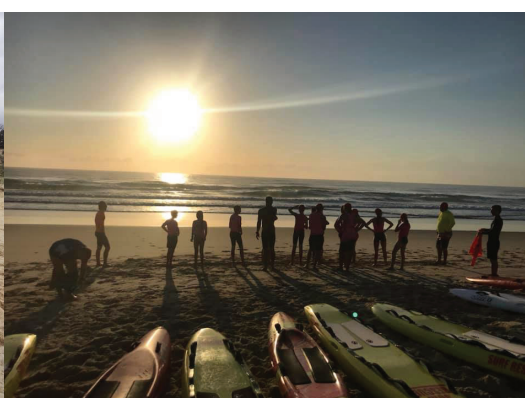

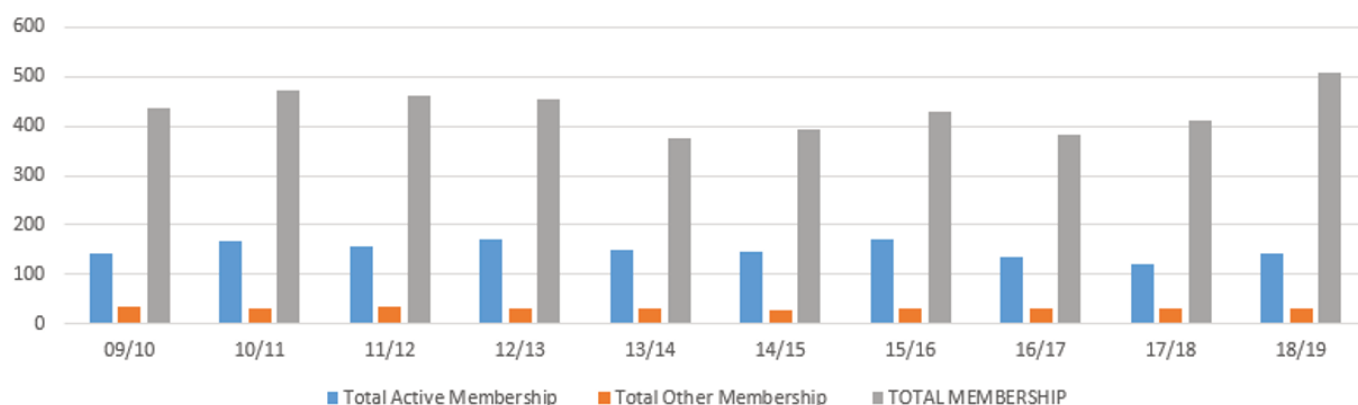

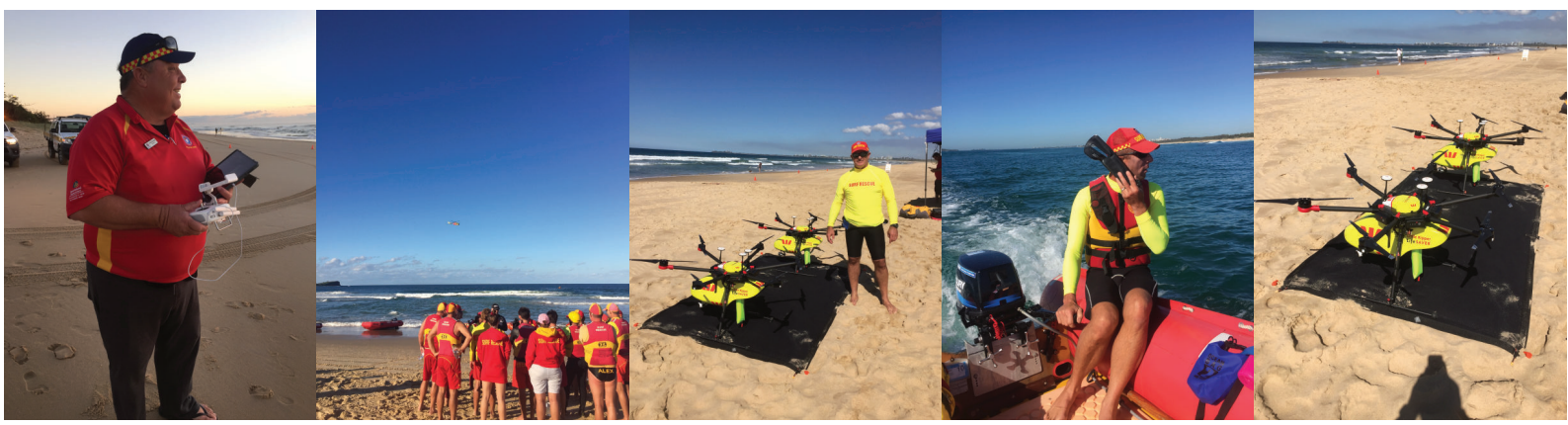

In the past funds were donated to surf and then lent back for the payment for these items. This is part of a transition required due to changes in accounting requirements.

There are some people I would like to thank and also some financial highlights and observations to point out.

Firstly, I would like to thank all our awesome frontline team in the bar and bistro. My personal opinion and a view shared by our patrons, I believe, is that they are as good as any team we have had.

Bistro food standards has been consistently high, and our super friendly bar team make members and guests feel very welcome and always go about their work with a smile and a personal touch. Well done Team.

We are extremely fortunate to have a long-term President of the Supporters Club in Craig Hunter Smith, who has held the reins for nearly a decade now and brings so much experience, wisdom and good judgement to direction and management of the Supporters Club. I would like to personally thank him for his guidance in my first year as Treasurer and thank him on behalf of the whole committee and club.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2019

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Financial Reporting Framework

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1981 (Queensland). The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

Statement of Compliance

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the Associations Incorporation Act 1981 (Queensland), the basis of accounting specified by all Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of Accounting Standards AASB 101: Presentation of Financial Statements, AASB 108: Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors and AASB 1054: Australian Additional Disclosures.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on an accrual basis and are based on historical costs. They do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

(a) Income Tax

The income tax expense (income) for the year comprises current income tax expense (income). The club does not apply deferred income tax expense (income).

(b) Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all PPE is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

Class of Fixed Asset	Depreciation Rate
Gaming machines	20%

(c) Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the committee reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

(d) Employee Provisions

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

(e) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

(f) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(g) Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

(h) Revenue and Other Income

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt. If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

(i) Leases

Leases of PPE, where substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to the ownership of the asset (but not the legal ownership) are transferred to the association, are classified as finance leases.

Finance leases are capitalised by recording an asset and a liability at the lower of the amounts equal to the fair value of the leased property or the present value of the minimum lease payments, including any guaranteed residual values. Lease payments are allocated between the reduction of the lease liability and the lease interest expense for that period.

Leased assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the shorter of their estimated useful lives or the lease term. Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses in the periods in which they are incurred.

(j) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

(k) Accounts payable and other payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days of recognition of the liability.
