From the President - Peter Hourn

What an exciting year for Marcoola Surf Life Saving Club with the highlight being named Queensland Surf Life Saving Club of the Year. This is a huge honour and came after being named Sunshine Coast Branch Life Saving Club of the Year. Each and every one of us should be very proud of this achievement as we have all contributed to this success in one way or another and it shows the strength of our Club as we continue to grow and maintain our family-oriented focus. The challenge going forward is to maintain our commitment and focus as the club grows.

This growth is nowhere more evident than in our Nipper program which was shut off at 250 this year. This is yet again a record number for the club and despite the wretched run after Christmas was once again successful and enjoyed by all. There is a tremendous amount of work that goes into running this program and with larger numbers comes the need for more volunteers. At 250 kids on the beach, we need at least 80 volunteers to do water safety and run the various programs. Leading this charge is our ever-present Junior Activities Committee Chair Amanda Janssen and Deputy Andrew Cullity, a massive thank you to them and all of those who help on a Sunday doing the behind the scenes work to make it all possible. Apologies for not being able to mention everyone but your efforts are greatly appreciated by the club.

Another significant achievement was again winning the Buhk Wilkes Trophy for the 16th time in the awards 35-year history. Well done to Jenko our Club Captain from last season, (sorry Geoff you have to wait till this year) Patrol Captains, Active Members, Award Members and not to be forgotten the office staff who all contribute to our success in this award, it highlights that we, as a club, have a lifesaving focus first and foremost.

On the lifesaving side we saw the introduction of a 12th Patrol team this year which has been a strategic goal for as long as I can remember. The feedback has been very positive and gives a good break between patrols and sets a great platform moving forward. The season was a year of 2 halves with before Christmas business as usual but after Christmas being impacted by dangerous conditions, weather and no beach. There were numerous weekends where we saw only the red flag flying but to your credit, patrols still turned up and put in the time making sure the public were safe and made aware of the conditions. A very big thank you to all who participated in patrols in whatever manner, it is through your numerous hours spent on the beach that has allowed us to keep the beach safe with no preventable deaths on our stretch once again.

The successes mentioned above do not come without a lot of work in the background and I would like to thank Geoff Jeffcoat for his tireless efforts behind the scenes in making sure that the club is running smoothly. I see Geoff at the club nearly every time I call in and I'm sure this is only the tip of the iceberg. As Director of Lifesaving, he has one of the most demanding jobs in the club and handles the position with professionalism and enthusiasm.

As the club grows so does the need for training to make sure our members can gain further awards. Thank you to Monique Gardiner and Ben Allsopp who filled the role of Chief Training Officer and to all the trainers and assessors who turn up on weekends and during the week to deliver this training. Without your dedication our club would not be in the position that we find ourselves in.

Our youth had another strong year, thank you to Alaina Schmidt for coordinating these activities, among the other things that she does around the club. It is great to see the large number of youth that turn up on a Sunday morning to do water safety for the Nippers, this truly makes a big difference to the Nipper program. I know there were some activities curtailed by Covid (I got this far without mentioning the dreaded word) but from what I hear you were able to work around this. One pleasing aspect is the continuation of us having a team in the local OZ Tag competition, and most importantly your participation in doing patrols.

On the competition front we were led again by our competitors in the Surf Rescue Championships where I am reliably informed that our members once again performed admirably. Congratulations to Darci Crittendell who took out a Bronze medal in the U15 Branch Champion Lifesaver. And well

done to Oceah Wulf for placing 3rd at the U14 Queensland Board Riding Championships. Our Surf Boat section represented the club at the National Titles on the Gold Coast in their new boat "The Marcoola Flash" (a special thanks here to Paddy Walsh Painting who donated the boat). Our teams performed well with the youth team being unlucky to miss the finals on a count back. Congratulations to Simon Drehlich, Owen Small & Mark Humphris who took out 1st place in the Taplin Relay (130 age group). For the first time ever we had a competitor in the Coolangatta Gold with Simon Drehlich competing in the half course event. The Club Championships were well attended, and all had a good time competing against each other. Outside of Surf Lifesaving John Ward competed in and finished the Ironman Marathon down at Port Macquarie. To put in into perspective John was either swimming, riding a bike or running for over 16 hours!!

The Club renovations continue to progress in the background and various options for how this will proceed to be worked through. At the time of writing, we are still awaiting DA approval from Council, which once through will allow us to explore different funding options.

To the Supporters Club Committee once again led by Craig Hunter-Smith, your continued contributions are instrumental in allowing us to provide the service that we do. I know it has once again been a challenging year with Covid restrictions being in place for a part of the year and also the challenge of trying to get staff especially chefs. To Patrick and his team in the Supporters Club thank you for your contributions in what has been trying times.

From The General Manager - Drew Palmer

A year of hard work and dedication by the entire team has been rewarded and recognised through a number of fantastic achievements!

Starting the year with being awarded Sunshine Coasts 'Surf Life Saving Club of the Year' for 2021 was fantastic recognition for everyone involved with the club. Not only did we take out the top award, we also celebrated by winning the Buhk Wilkes Memorial Trophy, the Youth Club Spirit Award and Natasha McCann took out the U15 Life Saver of the Year Award.

As we kicked off the "It's time to Celebrate" recognition campaign and invited all club members to join us, we undertook the next daunting, but extremely exciting step in presenting our case to the State Committee and it paid off...

Surf Life Saving Queensland's – Club of the Year 2021!

This is an amazing achievement and extremely well deserved for all the hard work and dedication that was involved in delivering the 20/21 season. The award recognised how we assisted the community by becoming the local hub during the Covid-19 restrictions, along with defying current volunteering trends, with our numbers continuing to grow across all classes of membership, including 16% growth in our Nippers ranks.

We built our overall strategy on supporting our new and existing members, along with strong financial management and sound governance practices. This award covers all bases and recognises that we're heading in the right direction. It's also worth mentioning that this is the first time we've won the Branch and State 'Club of the Year Award'!

We then went on to co-host the SLSA "Awards of Excellence" presentation and although we didn't take out the top award, we certainly still celebrated! This was a fantastic evening with club spirit flowing strong throughout the night.

In November, we received notification that we were unsuccessful for funding through the Building Better Regions Fund to assist with the Club Upgrade Project. Feedback from the Governments Business Grants Hub indicated that our application passed the eligibility criteria and was then evaluated on merit. Of the two main criteria, we delivered a strong submission in relation to Social Benefits for the community. The areas for improvement were within the Economic Benefits whereby we needed to demonstrate further progress in being 'shovel ready'. This includes further detailed architectural, construction and engineering plans, along with detailed costings via a tender process. A Special General Meeting, held on the 26th March 2022, approved funding up to \$300k ex gst to undertake the next phase of the planning works for the project once the DA has been approved.

The club has been working with Council through the Development Application process and has responded to a number of 'information requests' to further support our case with an outcome expected in the near future.

We've also participated in workshops and feedback sessions with the Sunshine Coast Council to enhance the adjoining Felix Parry Park. We're working with council to encourage formalisation of our 'unofficial carpark', along with improvements to the park area by relocating the toilet block and opening up more 'green space'. These enhancements are planned to deliver a combined toilet and storage facility for Council's lifeguards, along with safer vehicle, emergency, and pedestrian movements for Beach Access 103.

Our community-based programs continued to grow throughout the year with our Surf Education program delivering essential skills to over 325 students from Good Samaritan and

Pacific Paradise schools. Good Samaritan more than doubled their numbers this year along with increasing their time on the beach from 1 to 2-hour sessions. This certainly stretched our resources, however with good planning all the sessions ran smoothly. One of the benefits of running these programs includes many of the children from these schools signing up for Nippers and joining the Marcoola family.

We continue to support our community groups by providing them with areas within the club to meet and resources on our beach including:

- Marcus Men's Group
- The Marcoola Community Group
- QUESST (Queensland Emergency Services Surf Team)
- JETS AFL Committee
- Mudjimba Board Riders

The many iterations of Covid 19 restrictions during the year placed pressure on the entire operation. We're extremely pleased that the forced closures, number restrictions and vaccination requirements have come to an end. We still continue to feel the effects within our Supporters Club with many staff moving away from the hospitality industry over the past two years. The media talks about everything being 'normal' again, however times are still extremely challenging when you're unable to fill vacant positions.

I would like to thank and acknowledge the ongoing work and commitment of:

- Marcoola SLSC Board and officers;
- Marcoola Surf Live Saving Club Supporters Committee;
- Our sponsors,
- And of course, the dedicated team of staff in both Surf and Supporters who work tirelessly to ensure the operational elements of the club work like clockwork.

From the Director of Finance - Craig Hunter-Smith

The Marcoola Surf Life Saving Club Inc accounts from May 2021 to April 2022 is reported in the attached audited Financial Report. Our operating Surplus of \$58,393 was behind the prior year of \$269,249 which was bolstered by COVID incentives and a successful Supporter's Club strategy. Our Balance Sheet shows that the Club is in a strong position with available funds standing at \$861,071 compared to the prior year of \$769,959. Our liquidity ratio stands at a healthy 13.5 and with no long-term borrowings we are in a solid position to invest in our future needs.

Some major items which occurred during the year include:

- Sponsorship (\$27,273) and purchase of a new Surf boat (\$33,151); thanks Paddy Walsh Painting.
- Ongoing sponsorships from Austraffic, Bendigo Bank, North Shore Realty, Whites IGA, Techtonic Geotechnical Engineers, Coastal Connect, Kundra Park Automotive, DCF Co, Sunshine Coast Trailer Hire, McGregor Wealth Management, Flow on Plumbing, Loan Success, Small World Migration and Fiona Simpson MP and Craig Marker Accounting. Please give these sponsors your support.
- \$44,098 spent on new Gear and Equipment to support our surf operations.
- \$69,311 spent on the Building Upgrade project.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2022

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Financial Reporting Framework

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the *Associations Incorporation Act 1987 (Queensland)*. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity as the users of the financial statements are able to obtain additional information to meet their needs.

Statement of Compliance

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the *Associations Incorporation Act 1987 (Queensland)*, the basis of accounting specified by all Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of Accounting Standards AASB 101; *Presentation of Financial Statements*, AASB 108; *Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors* and AASB 1054; *Australian Additional Disclosures*.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on an accrual basis and are based on historical costs. They do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

- (a) **Income Tax**
The Club has received an exemption from income tax from the Australian Taxation Office under Section 50-40 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.
- (b) **Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)**
Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation. The depreciable amount of all PPE is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.
Leasehold improvements are amortised on a straight line basis over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.
The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

Class of Fixed Asset	Depreciation Rate
Building	2.5%
Plant and equipment	20%
Motor vehicles	15%

(c) **Impairment of Assets**

At the end of each reporting period, the committee reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired, if such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

(d) **Employee Provisions**

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

(e) **Provisions**

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

(f) **Cash and Cash Equivalents**

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(g) **Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors**

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2022

(h) **Revenue and Other Income**

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Operating grants and donations

When the association receives operating grant revenue or donations, it assesses whether the contract is enforceable and has sufficiently specific performance obligations in accordance with AASB 15.

When both these conditions are satisfied, the association:

- identifies each performance obligation relating to the grant - recognises a contract liability for its obligations under the agreement.
- recognises revenue as it satisfies its performance obligations.

Where the contract is not enforceable or does not have sufficiently specific performance obligations, the association:

- recognises the asset received in accordance with the recognition requirements of other applicable accounting standards (eg AASB 9, AASB 16, AASB 116 and AASB 138);
- recognises related amounts (being contributions by owners, lease liability, financial instruments, provisions, revenue or contract liability arising from a contract with a customer); and
- recognises income immediately in profit or loss as the difference between the initial carrying amount of the asset and the related amount.

If a contract liability is recognised as a related amount above, the association recognises income in profit or loss when or as it satisfies its obligations under the contract.

Capital grant

When the association receives a capital grant, it recognises a liability for the excess of the initial carrying amount of the financial asset received over any related amounts (being contributions by owners, lease liability, financial instruments, provisions, revenue or contract liability arising from a contract with a customer) recognised under other Australian Accounting Standards.

The association recognises income in profit or loss when or as the association satisfies its obligations under the terms of the grant.

Interest income

Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method.

Revenue from sale of goods

Revenue is recognised when control of the products has transferred to the customer. For such transactions, this is when the products are delivered to the customers. Revenue from these sales is based on the price stipulated in the contract, net of the estimated volume discounts.

Where there are expected volume discounts payable to the customers for sales made until the end of the reporting period, a contract liability is recognised.

A receivable will be recognised when the goods are delivered. The Association's right to consideration is deemed unconditional at this time as only the passage of time is required before payment of that consideration is due.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

(i) **Goods and Services Tax (GST)**

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

(j) **Financial Assets**

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the Association becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the Association commits itself to either the purchase or the sale of the asset (ie trade date accounting is adopted).

Financial instruments (except for trade receivables) are initially measured at fair value plus transaction costs, except where the instrument is classified "at fair value through profit or loss", in which case transaction costs are expensed to profit or loss immediately. Where available, quoted prices in an active market are used to determine fair value. In other circumstances, valuation techniques are adopted.

Trade receivables are initially measured at the transaction price if the trade receivables do not contain a significant financing component or if the practical expedient was applied as specified in AASB 15: *Revenue from Contracts with Customers*.

See you back on the beach for the 22/23 Season. Go Team Marcoola!

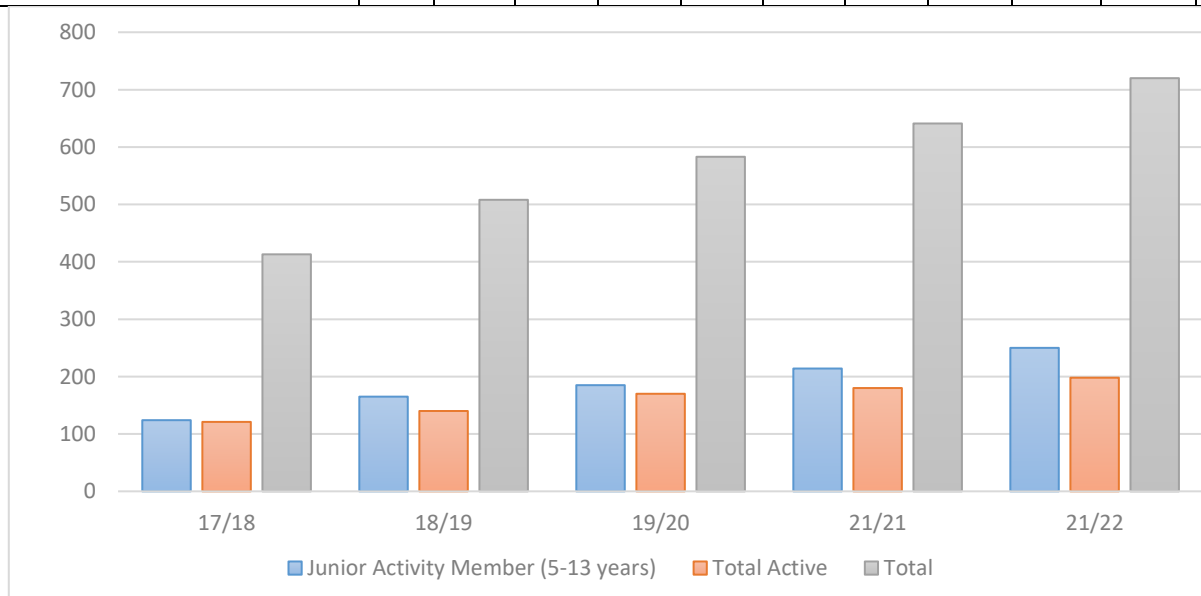

From the Director of Junior Activities - Amanda Janssen

Well, what an interesting season 2021/22 was for our Nippers, we experienced so many incredible highs in the first half of the season, only to come up against Covid (again) and some very unfortunate beach and surf conditions in 2022, resulting in our season being a complete wipe out! I can't remember ever experiencing a season like it. I do thank each and every one of you for your patience and understanding when we were forced to cancel our program more than we could conduct it. But let's try and focus on the positives and recount some of the highlights. The goal of our Junior Activities program remains quite simple:

"To deliver a quality lifesaving program for all members with a focus on surf awareness, surf safety & improved surf skills with an emphasis on FUN."

Despite the challenges that we faced; I think it is safe to say we were still able to smash this goal!

- Increased opportunities for training & skill development through the employment of a Swim Coach and Surf Rescue Coach.
- Increased leadership opportunities for our under-fourteens through the continuation of Nipper Leadership Program & integration into the Youth Program.

Congratulations to the team for providing the family friendly service Marcoola SLSC is renowned for.

I would like to thank the committee for the giving of their time over the past year. The committee comprise long standing members Peter Hourn, Rob McGregor, Ian Hunter and Brian Goulding with the new boys being Andrew Cullity and Justin Pettett. The meetings have always been congenial and progressive and it is important that we continue to look over the horizon and continue to develop our Club to meet the community needs.

Looking forward, our desired strategy to return to full operations will be tested through the expected coming tough economic times however the committee will manage the situation to obtain the best outcome for the Marcoola Surf Club.

Finally, thanks to all the patrons who have supported the club over the past year. We hope that you continue to support the Marcoola Surf Club as we intend to continue to provide the same efficient and friendly service for many years to come.

From the committee, management and staff we look forward to seeing you at the club during the upcoming year.

From The General Manager - Drew Palmer

A pleasing result based on a year of challenges stemming mainly from Covid 19 restrictions and lockdowns. Fortunately, the local community continues to support the club in all areas including bar, bistro and gaming with revenue growth in all areas. The restricted trading periods impacted on our overall result however we were still able to contribute donations to the value of \$150,000 and rent payments of \$250,000 to the Surf Life Saving Club.

Throughout the year we were able to support the "Club of the Year" celebrations and delivered a number of promotions and events to support this great achievement.

Our regular mix of raffles, member draws and promotions such as 'Spin n win' have been well patronised and have delivered good incentives for members and guests to keep coming back. Our entertainment options continue to draw good crowds, with the Surf and Sound sessions on the last Sunday of the month normally filling the place for the afternoon. We have been able to provide a number of new and updated machines within the gaming room, adding to the variety for members and guests.

Our team hosted visits from football teams including the Melbourne Storm and players from Queensland Reds and regularly hosts the Queensland Emergency Services Surf Team throughout the year.

From an operations perspective, the development of detailed policies and procedures across both financial and operational areas of the business has ensured the team is aligned and working well together.

A two-year trial by OLGR allowing community club licensees to sell liquor to local visitors commenced on 1st September, as part of the Queensland Government's economic recovery plan to support jobs and local communities. Under the Liquor Act 1992, community club licensees can only sell liquor to members, their guests, and visitors with the requirement that visitors must live at least 15 kilometres from the club's premises. As part of the new trial, clubs may elect to sell liquor to visitors who live any distance from their premises, therefore the 15-kilometre requirement for visitors will not be enforced.

Our main ongoing challenge is to attract and employ sufficient staff across the business, mainly in the kitchen. A nationwide shortage of chef's is making it extremely difficult to ensure we provide consistency and variety across our menu.

Many thanks to Pat for leading the team and achieving the good results through the challenges of the year. I would like to thank the entire team for their hard work and dedication throughout the year. Each time we thought things were on track we'd be thrown another curve ball, however, we were able to overcome these and deliver great service along the way.

We're looking forward to a year with more stability and the opportunity to enhance the product and service offerings to our members and guests.

From The Treasurer - Rob McGregor

The Marcoola Surf Club (Supporters Club) had a successful year, not without its challenges, as COVID lockdown and restrictions on numbers continued for much of this financial year.

Total rent and donations made to Surf Lifesaving was \$400k, a solid result considering we had restrictions on numbers for much of the year.

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies
Financial Reporting Framework

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the *Associations Incorporation Act 1987 (Queensland)*. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

Statement of Compliance

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with the *Associations Incorporation Act 1987 (Queensland)*, the basis of accounting specified by all Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of Accounting Standards AASB 101: *Presentation of Financial Statements*, AASB 108: *Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors* and AASB 1064: *Australian Additional Disclosures*.

The association has confirmed that the requirements set out in AASB 10 and AASB 128 are not applicable as the initial assessment on its interests in other entities indicated that it does not have any subsidiaries, associates or joint ventures.

Hence, the financial statements comply with all the recognition and measurement requirements in Australian Accounting Standards.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on an accrual basis and are based on historical costs. They do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

(a) Income Tax

The income tax expense (income) for the year comprises current income tax expense (income). The association does not apply deferred income tax expense (income).

(b) Property, Plant and Equipment (PPE)

Leasehold improvements and office equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all PPE is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

Class of Fixed Asset	Depreciation Rate
Gaming machines	20%
Plant and equipment	20%

(c) Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the committee reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs of disposal and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

(d) Employee Provisions

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

(e) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

(f) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(g) Accounts Receivable and Other Debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors include amounts due from members as well as amounts receivable from donors. Receivables expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivables are classified as non-current assets.

(h) Leases

The Association as lessee

The Association has a short term lease in place for the lease of premises from Maroola Surf Life Saving Club. As it is a short term lease, the lease has been expensed as it is due and AASB16: Leases does not apply.

(i) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

(j) Revenue

Revenue recognition

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable after taking into account any trade discounts and volume rebates allowed. For this purpose, deferred consideration is not discounted to present values when recognising revenue.

Operating grants

When the association receives operating grant revenue, it assesses whether the contract is enforceable and has sufficiently specific performance obligations in accordance with AASB 16.

When both these conditions are satisfied, the Association:

- identifies each performance obligation relating to the grant;
- recognises a contract liability for its obligations under the agreement; and
- recognises revenue as it satisfies its performance obligations.

Where the contract is not enforceable or does not have sufficiently specific performance obligations, the Association:

- recognises the asset received in accordance with the recognition requirements of other applicable Accounting Standards (for example, AASB 9, AASB 16, AASB 116 and AASB 138);
- recognises related amounts (being contributions by owners, lease liability, financial instruments, provisions, revenue or contract liability arising from a contract with a customer); and
- recognises income immediately in profit or loss as the difference between the initial carrying amount of the asset and the related amount.

If a contract liability is recognised as a related amount above, the association recognises income in profit or loss when or as it satisfies its obligations under the contract.

Interest income

Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method.

Income from sale of goods

Revenue is recognised when control of the products has transferred to the customer. For such transactions, this is when the products are delivered to the customers. Revenue from these sales is based on the price stipulated in the contract. Revenue is then only recognised to the extent that there is a high probability that a significant reversal of revenue will not occur.

A receivable will be recognised when the goods are delivered. The Association's right to consideration is deemed unconditional at this time as only the passage of time is required before payment of that consideration is due.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.
